Lucie Laurian is a Professor at the Urban and Regional Planning Programme of the University of Iowa, USA. Currently on *sabbatical*, and visiting Portugal. Prof. Laurian is a pioneer in the field of *Environmental (in)Justice*, with spatial analysis, and now exploring the challenges of *Deep Horizon Planning* (Long Term Forecast). Her main research interests are: urban and environmental planning, plan evaluation and implementation (USA and NZ), environmental injustice, public participation in decision-making (USA and Europe)

With a Ph.D. in City and Regional Planning at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (Dissertation: *Cleaning-up contaminated sites: residents' perceptions and responses*); a DESS of Expert Demographer, University Panthéon-Sorbonne, Paris; a DEA and a Masters in Sociology, certificate of Demography, University René Descartes- Paris V., Professor Lucie Laurian was an Assistant Prof. at the University of Arizona Graduate College, and a Teaching fellow for the Dept. of Public Policy Analysis, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, USA.

Professor Laurian was Research Assistant for the “Planning Under a Cooperative Mandate” project on plan implementation in New Zealand; and for the Carolina Population Center (Research on the determinants and consequences of migration to Quito, Ecuador; Analysis of the 1997 Migration, Employment and Gender Relations Origin-Destination Multilevel survey; Micro-statistical research on the determinants of the out-migration of children of settlers from the Ecuadorian Amazon.

As an Intern at the United Nations Population Division, she researched on women, internal migrations and poverty in developing countries, with Dr. Hania Zlotnik.

Professor Lucie Laurian is also a member of CITIDEP (Research Center on Information Technologies and Participatory Science), and was a key participant in ICCPIT Conferences co-organized by CITIDEP and UNL (1999) and MIT (2003).

Professor Laurian has been frequently invited to lecture at e-Planning PhD courses, and her contributions are always warmly welcome both by students and faculty.
